Experience

I am 44 years-old, began rice-growing in 1993, and now run a 2400 ha mixed farm at Moulamein with my wife, Sue and two sons. I served 12 years on the Rice Research Committee, chairing the Extension Committee that produced the rice growing guide 'Production of Quality Rice in South-East Australia'. I also served as chairman of RGA's Environment Working Group. I was a founding board member of the Moulamein Grain Co-operative, which now receives, stores and assists growers to market about 350,000 tonnes of grain per year.

In response to the Millenium Drought, our family spent 2008-2011 in Laos, where I undertook a PhD on water productivity and led sections of an ACIAR project on intensifying and diversifying Lao lowland rice systems.

From early 2011 to January 2015, I was Head of the Experiment Station (ES) at the International Rice Research Institute (IRRI) in the Philippines, managing a permanent staff of 75 and contract staff of up to 800 to provide research facilities for IRRI. We modernized infrastructure and equipment, reformed both the permanent and contract staffing and established business viability for ES for the first time. I used the opportunity to develop a network across much of the rice-growing world, developing my knowledge of rice grain quality and my understanding of global rice production and consumption.

I can complement the existing Board, with:

A PhD and particularly a Masters in Economics; A theoretical and hands-on understanding of rice grain quality; A knowledge of global rice production and consumption patterns; Recent experience in both Asian culture and business; Experience working in a large international business.

Vision for SunRice

SunRice lives in interesting times. Water supplies are tighter and more variable which make a high paddy price essential, but the future for our product and our brand looks bright. The Board and staff have done an excellent job in securing better returns for both A and B class shareholders, and a better balance sheet, since the time of the Ebro offer.

SunRice can now invest to secure better returns for both A and B class shareholders. It can invest to secure quality alternate supplies when the Riverina cannot supply, to ensure we keep and grow our best markets. The Board— We need a cohesive and constructive Board to focus on retaining a financially strong and successful company. As we continue to grow the SunRice brand, a Riverina crop as well as global sourcing is critical to this success. Consequently the need for good communication and a sustainable price to growers is paramount.

I am a rice grower in the Deniliquin and Coleambally districts, operating a mixed farming enterprise which has produced rice every year for the past 39 years.

I have been a Director of SunRice for 14 years and am a Director of Riviana Foods and a Director of Solomon's Rice Company Ltd (Solomon Islands). Additionally, I am Chairman of Rice Research Australia Pty Ltd and a Member of Rice Research and Development Committee (RIRDC). Director Committees held are: Member of Grower Services, Safety Health and Environment and the Rice Industry Coordination Committee. Delegate to the Irrigation Research and Extension Committee and a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

I see rice as the main stay of many Riverina Farming Enterprises. With reduced access to water we are going to have to grow more with less. Thus we need to engage with Politicians and Bureaucrats to modify the "Water Act" to allow the National Water Holder to sell water on a temporary trade.

Research and Development will be the key to the future as water will always be a constraint going forward. Short season cold tolerant varieties are already coming through the breeding program for evaluation. The idea of breeding aerobic rice varieties specifically adapted for the Riverina conditions will further entrench rice as your summer crop of choice.

I strongly believe the restructure of SunRice is a real opportunity to grow the paddy price whilst providing access to a deeper pool of equity capital thereby enabling expansion into new growth markets. Good for growers and shareholders alike.
